# Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ

Imagine you are living in the first century. A person you know has extended an invitation to dine with him and his family. You accept the invitation, because you know that meals are very personal and a much defined cultural event. This was why Jesus raised so many eyebrows

when he ate with sinners and tax collectors. So on the evening of the meal, you show up at the door, and as you are greeted by your friend and you enter the house, you are astounded by what you see. You begin to back out the door, but your friend takes you by the hand and leads you inside the house. What astounded you was that around the table there were both women and men at the same table, a Greek and a Jew sharing a cup, a person in rich clothes handing bread to a person in ragged clothes, and at the end of the table sat a slave as if he/she belonged there.

You are at a loss in trying to understand how all of these people could be around the same table. You shout out, "How is this possible - How can this be?" And your friend answers, "We are all one in Jesus Christ."

Today, how do we eat our meals at home or at another's home? Are we picky about who we eat with? Have we ever refused an invitation because we knew who was going to be there? I confess that in the past I would at times ask who was going to be there, and if I thought I didn't like who was going or thought it would be a problem for me, I would back out from the meal or gathering. Was I right to do so? Have any of you been in that situation?

In the gospel Jesus said, "Have them sit down in groups of fifty." He didn't say, "Have the women sit here and the men sit over there," or "Have the slaves serve the others and then they can eat what is left." Jesus simply said, "Have them sit down in groups." And that is what happened. Paul understood this connection; Paul knew that Jesus was reconciling communities, bringing everyone together. In Paul's famous words, "We are one body because we partake of the one bread."

The Feast of the Body and Blood of Christ (Corpus Christi) causes many to scratch their heads wondering what it is all about. When the feast was originally presented to us it had a two-fold intention. First, it was intended to focus on the Real Presence of Jesus in the Eucharist. Secondly, it was to focus on the Real Presence of Jesus in the world.

We, in our hearts acknowledged and received the Real Presence of Christ, and then during the liturgy, we processed around the church to the four exterior altars to show the world (the communities outside our church) the Real Presence of Christ. The focus on The Real Presence of Christ in the Eucharist is in the words of Jesus, "This is my body that is for you - Do this in remembrance of me."

In the Eucharist, Jesus is as close to us as he was to those people who walked with him on the dusty roads of Palestine. In fact, he is even closer. Those people received bread at his hands, but we receive the Lord himself in Holy Communion. He comes to dwell in us, and then we carry him to others, through our examples, words, and actions. As Knights this is how we bring the action of

the Eucharist to the world. We can say that every Christian, every follower of Christ, is another Christ.

The Eucharist is the extraordinary food that makes this possible. Ordinary food is absorbed by us and becomes part of our bodies. But when we receive the Eucharist, it absorbs us; it makes us into more and more, living members of Christ's body.

This is who we, brother Knights are: co-workers of God, Co-Workers in the Vineyard, created to put our talents at the service of building his Kingdom. If we live this mission, it gives us the meaning and fruitfulness we yearn for.

Blessed Mother Teresa of Calcutta said, "Each one of us is a co-worker of Christ - we must labor hard to carry Him to the hearts where He has not yet been known and loved." "But unless we have Jesus, we cannot give Him; that is why we need the Eucharist." "Spend as much time as possible in front of the Blessed Sacrament and He will fill you with His strength and His power."

I can remember when I first started studying to become Catholic in an RCIA class in 1997, and when I was told that I could not receive the Eucharist, the Body and Blood of Christ. I did not understand why not. Then when I learned about the Eucharist, the Real Presence of Christ, I fully understood.

In the past, during my younger years, before becoming Catholic, I would receive communion as a Presbyterian and only at Easter, and that was only a symbolic act of what was performed at the Last Supper. What I received was only a piece of bread and a small cup of grape juice that was placed on large tables. And during my RCIA studies, I couldn't wait to receive communion in the Catholic Church, the real Body and Blood of Christ. I became like a child waiting for Christmas, waiting to open that big Christmas gift that I knew I you would be receiving. But that gift at my First Holy Communion was the opening of my heart to Christ, fully accepting Him, but then becoming part of Him, and He becoming part of me.

This Solemnity of Corpus Christi is not just about Jesus giving Himself, Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity, in the Holy Eucharist. It is also about the Eucharist transforming the Church, His body. It is about the Eucharist transforming us, because we are the Church.

May this wonderful solemnity touch all of our hearts, all of our minds, and all of our souls, so that we can be transformed as the people of God, entering into the living presence of our Lord Jesus Christ, who is forever present in this world. May the Body and Blood of the Lord remove our sins and stains so that the loving and compassionate face of Christ may give light to our entire world.

My brother Knights, let us not simply "get" or "receive" Holy Communion. Let us - ENTER INTO - Holy Communion, let us enter into Christ's life that is among us, let us come together at the same table, the table of the Lord, all women and men seated together, all races, whether rich or poor, sharing the same cup, for we are all one in Jesus Christ.

# **Blessed Fr Michael McGivney**

August 12 – Fr Michael McGivney Birthday

August 13 – Fr Michael McGivney Feast Day

August 14 – Fr Michael McGivney Death

The official Feast Day in the Catholic Church of Blessed Father Michael McGivney, patron and founder of the Knights of Columbus, is August 13. The feast is celebrated annually across the universal Catholic Church. Blessed Fr. McGivney was born on August 12, 1852 and passed away on August 14, 1890 (aged 38). His feast day is celebrated on the 13<sup>th</sup> because it falls between these two dates. Blessed Fr. McGivney was Beatified on October 31, 2020 at the Cathedral of Saint Joseph in Hartford, Connecticut by Cardinal Joseph W. Tobin (on behalf of Pope Francis). This Cathedral is the Diocese Seat for the Blessed Fr. McGivney's shrine that also was the final parish church he served at during his life as a Priest and also where he founded the Knights (Church of Saint Mary in New Haven, Connecticut).

Blessed McGivney was born of Irish immigrant parents in Waterbury, Conn., and began his priestly ministry in 1887 after being ordained in Baltimore. At a time of anti-Catholic sentiment, he worked tirelessly to offer practical solutions to immigrant Catholic communities in Connecticut. In 1882, he founded the Knights of Columbus to provide spiritual support to men and offer financial resources for families that had suffered the loss of a breadwinner. He died of pneumonia on Aug. 14, 1890, after falling ill amid a pneumonia pandemic.

The process for his possible canonization officially opened in 1997. In March 2008, Pope Benedict XVI declared Father McGivney "a Venerable Servant of God," citing the "remarkable accomplishment of that exemplary American priest." Beatification brings Father McGivney one step further in the canonization process.


