What's Happening?

Dear Brother Knights and Ladies,

The first thing I want to do this month is to suggest we - me included - listen to TV programs different from our own point of view. If you are a committed viewer of FOX, try to occasionally watch CNN or MSNBC. If you watch MSNBC or CNN, try FOX. I do not expect you to agree with the different perspective, but maybe we will realize that "our" station does not have all the news as it stands.

Some other "news" to know: The *Miami Herald* has interviewed men released from Alligator Alcatraz who talk of beatings with baseball bats, rotten food, lack of AC, inadequate bathroom facilities, and other degrading situations. Last week Archbishop Wenski of Miami went down to Alligator Alcatraz with fellow Knights on motorcycles including the archbishop, aka "Knights on Bikes." He went to try to say Mass for those incarcerated. He and Bishop Frank Dewayne of Venice were not allowed in!

I have also heard that persons whose only "crime" is that they came in illegally - even those who have done nothing else wrong and have worked and paid taxes, et cetera - are afraid they could be arrested by ICE without any recourse to a judge or to a hearing. As a result, in parishes like nearby Light of Christ, people of color or of Spanish surnames have stopped going to

church out of fear of being arrested by ICE. They do not send their kids to school for the same reason. Fear of being deported without cause basically keeps them as prisoners of their homes. Real News.

St Clare, Virgin, Memorial

St Clare was born in Assisi in Jul 1193. Her father was very wealthy with a castle on the slope of Mt Subasio. Her mother, Ortelena, was very pious and a devout Christian. St Clare was very prayerful and one day she met St Francis of Assisi in the church of San Giorgio and requested that he help her live as the Gospel Teacher. At the age of 18, on the evening of Palm Sunday, Clare secretly left her home in the company of her aunt and went to St Francis at Portiuncula Chapel. She was accepted by the Benedictine nuns of San Paulo and began living with them. Since her father had different motivations for her, he arranged marriage and therefore tried to force her to leave the convent and go back home to be married. Clare resisted those attempts and declared that Jesus Christ is her only husband. To spare Clare of the constant disruptions from her father, St Francis relocated her to another Benedictine Nuns monastery of Saint Angelo in Parzu.

Her sister Catarina joined her, and they moved to another small dwelling near San Damiano Church. Other women joined them, including her mother and people christened them the name "Poor Ladies of San Damiano." This was because they lived a life of seclusion, poverty and austerity as per the rule that St Francis had given them. It became the "Order of Poor Ladies of San Damiano," and she became their leader. In 1263, it took the name "Order of Saint Clare." Saint Clare's sisters did not go off and preach but remained enclosed in prayer and doing manual labor. During St Francis' last days before death, St Clare took care of him. She embraced Francis as her spiritual father.

On August 9, 1253, two days before her death, Pope Innocent IV approved the rule that St Clare had written, and it became the governing rule for Clare's Order of Poor Ladies. This marked the first time in history that a woman wrote a rule for religious life that was formally approved.

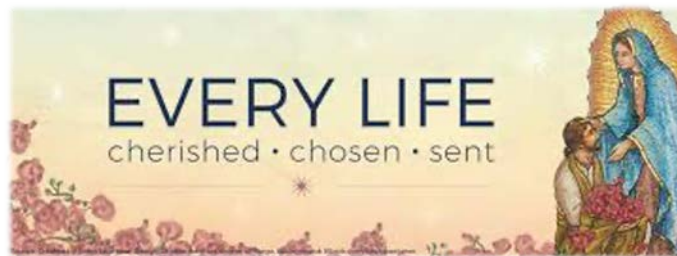

The Heart That Remembers: The Immaculate Flame

There is a heart so pure, so luminous, so filled with sorrow and glory, that heaven itself chose to dwell within it. It does not throb with the noise of pride or ambition, but with the eternal rhythm of surrender. It is not encased in armor or stone but wrapped in silence and crowned with fire. It is the Immaculate Heart of Mary, and in the Church's wisdom, the month of August is set aside to contemplate its mystery and its power.

This is no sentimental devotion. This is a summons. A call to consecration. A call to reparation. A call to become living flames within the darkened landscape of this fallen world. In August, we do not simply remember Mary. We run to her. We do not simply admire her heart. We entrust our own into its keeping. And through her heart, we are led back to Christ, the furnace of divine love that never ceases to burn.

The Church has long associated August with the Immaculate Heart of Mary, even though the feast is traditionally celebrated on the Saturday after the Sacred Heart in June. Yet since the days of Fatima, Catholics around the world have embraced August as a month-long pilgrimage of the heart, a sacred season of remembrance, repentance, and renewal under the mantle of the Queen of Heaven. This is not liturgical inertia. It is the wisdom of the faithful. It is the cry of the soul longing for a mother in the storm.

In 1917, on a remote hillside in Portugal, the heavens opened, and a woman clothed in light appeared to three children. She did not speak in riddles. She spoke plainly. The world was racing toward destruction, and only through prayer, penance, and consecration to her Immaculate Heart could it be saved. She did not come to warn. She came to prepare. For peace would not descend like dew. It would come through fire, through sacrifice, through surrender, through love.

The Fatima message is the great prophecy of our age. The Rosary was given as our weapon. Consecration

as our defense. Reparation as our plea for mercy. In 1942, as the world burned in war, Pope Pius XII consecrated all humanity to her Immaculate Heart. Two years later, he extended the feast across the earth. These were not ceremonial gestures. These were acts of battle, declared from the heights of faith.

The Immaculate Heart of Mary is not a passive devotion. It is a burning command. It demands that we lay down our pride, our noise, our compromise, and take up the weapons of the spirit. The heart of Mary is the heart of the Church, the hearth of purity, the throne of intercession. And in August, her heart opens wider than ever before.

To honor her is not to decorate her. It is to imitate her. It is to give God our yes, even when the sword of sorrow hangs overhead. It is to live the Rosary. It is to wear the Miraculous Medal not as jewelry, but as a banner. It is to walk the path of penance, not out of guilt, but out of love. It is to make our homes temples of grace and our hands extensions of mercy.

To truly honor the Immaculate Heart in August is to awaken. To act. To kneel, to weep, to pray, to fast, to forgive, to hope. It is to consecrate our children, our work, our country, and our future to the Woman whose heart knew no sin. It is to read again the words of Sister Lucia and take them not as relic, but as roadmap. It is to believe that Mary's triumph is not a myth. It is a promise.

Let August be a furnace. Let it refine us. Let it burn away the apathy. Let it remind us that holiness is not for the few, but for the brave. Let us become her apostles. Let our lives become her litany. Let our homes carry her peace. Let our prayers hasten her triumph.

For in her heart, the Church is reborn. In her tears, the world is washed clean. And in her love, we see the face of Christ.

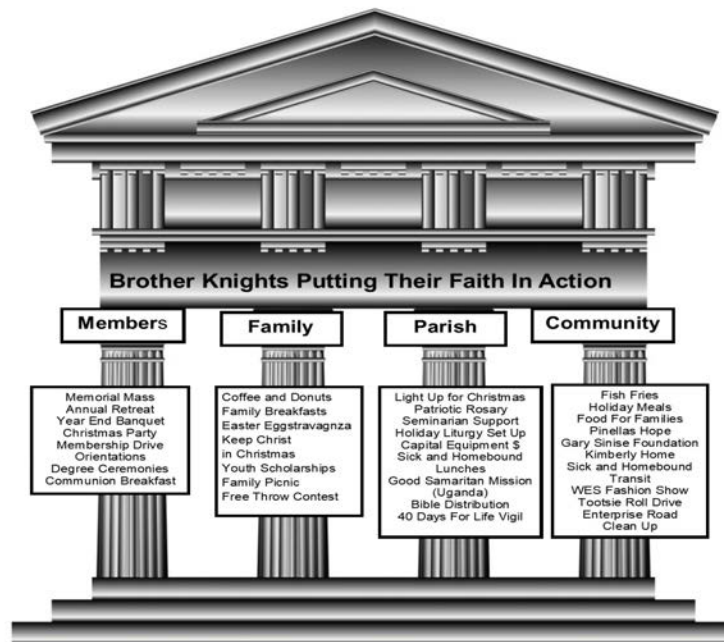

The Mysteries of Our Faith

Our Catholic faith is based on many mysteries, which come from three sources: Sacred Scripture, Sacred Tradition, and the interpretation of the Holy See. I pray the rosary using Bishop Barron on the Hallow App. He has wonderful explanations of each mystery, which are insightful and inspiring. I was taken by his explanation on the Assumption, probably because that Feast is in August. Not only is the Assumption a mystery, it's a Glorious Mystery; and not only is it a Feast Day, it is also a Holy Day.

The Glorious Mysteries include the Resurrection and Ascension of Jesus, the Descent of the Holy Spirit, and the Assumption and Coronation of Mary. That's quite a string of our faith in its own right and reminds me of a discussion I had with a Baptist friend over 60 years ago while going through OTS. He asked me why Catholics worshipped Mary and the Saints seemingly as much as God Himself. I explained that we do not hold either Mary or the Saints as divine. I used the Litany of Saints as an example. Any request we make of God (Father, Son or Holy Spirit) follows with the petition Have mercy on us. While any request of Mary or any Saint our petition changes to Pray for us. I followed by saying that we were becoming friends and I knew him well enough to ask him to pray for me, and I hoped that he would feel comfortable in asking me to pray for him. We became lifelong friends, and unfortunately, I attended his funeral a few years ago.

We see this same theological difference in the Glorious Mysteries. Christ's Resurrection and Ascension are based on His Divine power. The Descent of the Holy Spirit is also made possible by Divine Power. But Mary's Assumption and Coronation are not based on her holiness or authority; these actions require divine intervention.

The placement of the Assumption in the middle of August is interesting. Most of our "big" events come

between All Saints Day in November and Pentecost in late May. Why? Tradition. Mary's death and Assumption are not specifically mentioned in Scripture. We are not certain where Mary died or where she was interred. Roman Catholic tradition believes Mary traveled with John after Christ's death and died near Ephesus in western Turkey. I have visited that site and could sense the holiness. The Eastern Orthodox Church believes Mary remained in Jerusalem and is interred in a tomb near the Mount of Olives. The Roman and Orthodox churches recognize the tradition of the Assumption of Mary. Its importance is that Mary was the first human to benefit from the gift of eternal life, which was purchased for us by the life and death of her son.

Although there is no specific mention of Mary's death or Assumption in Scripture, numerous passages have been used through tradition and interpretation to explain this mystery as well as Mary's Coronation as Queen of Heaven. Revelations 12:1-6 is one of these. "A great sign appeared in the sky, a woman clothed with the sun, with the moon under her feet, and on her head a crown of twelve stars. She was with child and wailed aloud in pain as she labored to give birth. Then another sign appeared in the sky; it was a huge red dragon, with seven heads and ten horns, and on its heads were seven diadems. Its tail swept away a third of the stars in the sky and hurled them down to the earth. Then the dragon stood before the woman about to give birth, to devour her child when she gave birth. She gave birth to a son, a male child, destined to rule all the nations with an iron rod. Her child was caught up to God and his throne. The woman herself fled into the desert where she had a place prepared by God, that there she might be taken care of for twelve hundred and sixty days."

Don't you just love a good mystery? Blessed Virgin Mary, Mother of God and Queen of Heaven, pray for us.

Walking Together in Charity

The spirituality of St. Augustine, taught and lived by Pope Leo, is echoed in the principles and mission of the Knights

Pope Leo XIV is the first member of the Order of St. Augustine to be elected pope, and his commitment to the religious order and its charism was evident from the start of his pontificate. After his election on May 8, the Holy Father stepped onto the central balcony of St. Peter's Basilica and told the world: "I am an Augustinian, a son of St. Augustine."

What does this mean for the Knights of Columbus? The short answer is that we have much in common with this son of St. Augustine.

Pope Leo's entire life has been shaped by the thought of St. Augustine (354-430) and the order named after him. He attended an Augustinian high school and then Villanova, the only Augustinian university in the United States, before entering the novitiate in 1977. From 2002 to 2013, he served as prior general of the worldwide Order of St. Augustine.

The Augustinians' core values are often described as unity, community and friendship — themes that Blessed Michael McGivney also infused into the Knights of Columbus. And like the Knights, the Augustinians are known for building strong fraternal bonds, so they can then dedicate themselves to works of charity and sacrifice for others, especially the poor and the outcast.

Reflecting on the centrality of unity in Augustine's thought, then-Cardinal Robert Prevost said in a 2023 interview that "you cannot say you are a follower of Christ without being part of the Church." Unity and communion, he added, are fundamental to "understanding what the Church is and what it means to be in it."

For St. Augustine, the Christian life is a team sport. It means never going it alone. We see this in Pope Leo's choice of an episcopal motto: "*In Illo uno unum*" — a phrase from St. Augustine's *Exposition on the Psalms*: "Although we Christians are many, in the one Christ we are one."

Another theme that the Knights of Columbus shares with the Augustinian tradition is the role of friendship — or fraternity — in following Christ. Augustine's conversion came about, in part, through the influence of his friends. He came to believe that living a Christian life required the daily support of others who could strengthen him in faith. When asked to serve as a bishop, he agreed on the condition that he would live with a community of priests.

St. Augustine is also known for reflecting on the longings of the human heart — especially our desire to love and be loved. In his spiritual autobiography, the *Confessions*, he writes: "You have made us for yourself, O Lord, and our hearts are restless until they rest in thee."

Last month, Pope Leo brought many of these themes home — quite literally to his hometown of Chicago. In a video message to tens of thousands gathered at the White Sox stadium and others watching online, he said we should pay attention to the "restlessness" of our hearts, because it can help lead us to "do something with our own lives to serve others."

That is how we will find true meaning, he said. "So many people who suffer from different experiences of depression or sadness — they can discover that the love of God is truly healing, that it brings hope," he added. "Coming together as friends, as brothers and sisters, in community, in a parish, in an experience of living our faith together, we can find that the Lord's grace, that the love of God can truly heal us, can give us the strength we need, can be the source of hope that we all need in our lives."

May we, the Knights of Columbus, walk together with Pope Leo and our fellow members of the Body of Christ in the bonds of charity, unity and fraternity — so that we might all follow Christ more closely through lives of humble service.

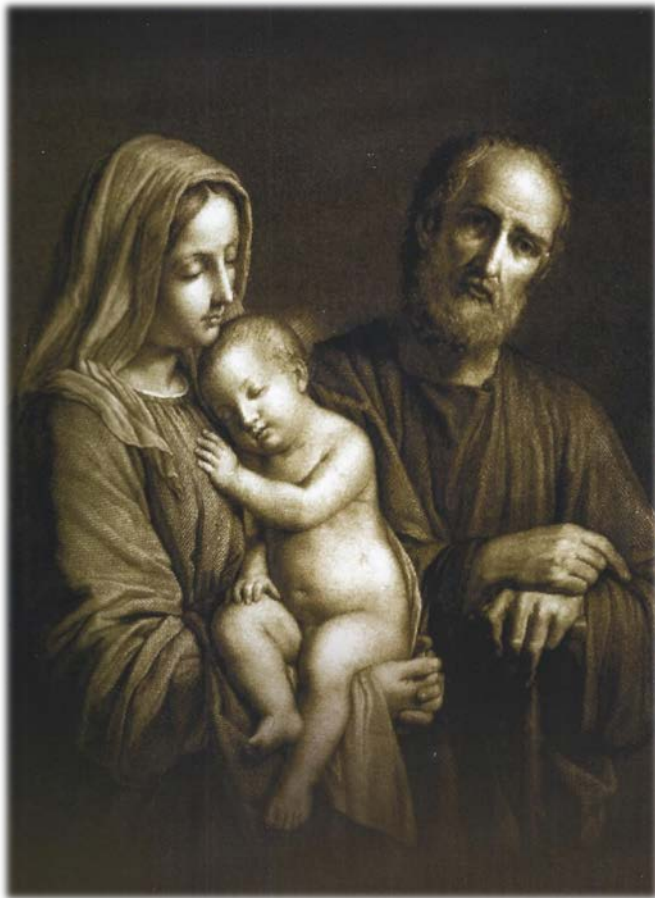

Heavenly Father, thank you for the gift of our family. Enlighten our hearts and minds that we may live more fully this vocation to love.

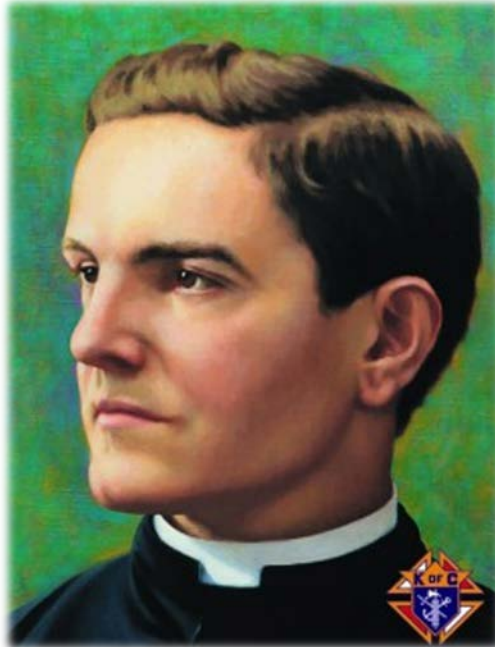
In our daily life and work,

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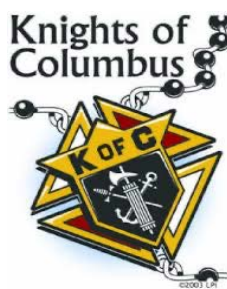
