WHY IS OUR BANK BALANCE SO HIGH?

Words of Wisdom by Grand Knight Chuck Donelson

Last Thursday evening, at our monthly Council Meeting, Sir Knight Brother Warren Augenthaler asked the question about why we were not spending more money for charitable giving since our bank account was over \$19,000? Great question! I am not sure that I answered this question as well as I should have. So, let me start from the beginning.

Since I joined this Council, we have always tried to keep our account balance in the \$8-10,000 range. Most of this balance, but not all, was from fund raising events where we raised money to donate to causes which the Council deemed worthy. This balance has been the benchmark for our Program Year ending balance. As you recall, our 2025-2026 Council Budget called for additional carryover funds of \$4,000. The actual carry over was approximately \$6,000. This was partially due to the fact that we had not yet given the parish a \$2,000 in-kind donation for the prior year and that the Golf Outing was not entirely closed and recipients paid.

Our Council's Account ending balance on August 31, 2025 was \$19,189.21. Based on this, Warren's comment was entirely proper. When I responded to Warren, I stated:

- We have an unpaid invoice to reimburse Our Lady of Mount Carmel Parish for the fans and electrical work on the patio at Tillotson Hall. This is approximately \$2,500.
- We have very few fund raisers in the first half of the year and we carry a heavier balance than normal.
- At the end of our Program Year, we had a carry over of \$6,000 instead of \$4,000 because of some unpaid reimbursements to Our Lady of Mount Carmel Parish.

What I failed to share with everyone was that:

• Last year we had a \$5,000 donation to the Knights that specifically stated that the donation was for use by and on the behalf of the Knights. It was for our use; not for disbursement to other charitable causes.

So, lets add the variances that I have just shared with you:

\$10,000.00 Desired Balance of Account at Program Year End 6/30/2025

2,500.00 Unpaid reimbursement to Our Lady of Mount Carmel Parish (fans, et al)

5,000.00 Donation for specific use by the Knights of Council 15821

2,000.00 Additional Excess Carry Over from Program Year 2024-2025 (\$6K - \$4K)

\$19,500.00 Calculated Ending Balance (8/31/23025) from Adjustments

\$19,189.21 Actual Ending Balance of Account (8/31/2025)

We have not spent any of the \$5,000 which we were given for supporting our Parish. Our benefactor made clear that this gift was strictly for the use of the Knights for the Knights. I would suggest that we ask Warren to recruit a couple of other long-time Council Members and make some suggestions as to how we might spend this gift, either partially, or entirely.

As we have just celebrated Labor Day I thought that, this month, I would reflect on the significance of Labor Day and the Dignity of Human Work.

As Knights, Labor Day offers us more than a long weekend or a break from routine—it invites us into a deeper contemplation of the sacredness of work and the dignity of the human person. In a society that often measures success by productivity, efficiency, and profit margins, we are called to remember that labor is not merely an economic activity but a participation in God's creative work.

From the very beginning, Scripture affirms the value of work. In Genesis, God places Adam in the garden "to till it and keep it" (Gen 2:15). Work is not a punishment but a vocation—a way of cooperating with God in the stewardship of creation. Even Christ Himself, before beginning His public ministry, spent years as a carpenter. The Incarnation sanctifies human labor: the Son of God chose to work with His hands, to sweat, to shape wood, to live the rhythm of ordinary toil. This was deliberate, to show us the dignity of ordinary human labor.

The Church has long upheld the dignity of labor through her social teachings. Pope Leo XIII's Rerum Novarum and Pope John Paul II's Laborem Exercens remind us that work is for man, not man for work. The human person must never be reduced to a cog in a machine or a mere economic unit. Labor is a means of expressing our human dignity, of providing for our families, and of contributing to the common good. It is also a path to holiness. And, our new Pope, Pope Leo XIV, has already made clear that social justice is something that we will hear much more about during his pontificate.

Labor Day, then, becomes a moment to reflect on several key truths. Firstly, that work is a vocation: Whether we are tradesmen, professionals, fathers, or retirees, our labor—paid or unpaid—is a response to God's call. We are co-creators with Him, building not just structures or systems, but communities and futures. Our work, when done with integrity and love, becomes a form of prayer.

Secondly, workers deserve justice: Catholic social teaching insists on the rights of workers—just wages, safe conditions, rest, and the ability to support one's family. As men of faith, we are called to advocate for these rights, not just for ourselves but for those whose voices are often unheard: the immigrant, the day laborer, the unemployed.


Thirdly, the idea that rest is sacred: Labor Day doesn't just remind us of the dignity of work but also reminds us of the importance of Sabbath. God Himself rested on the seventh day—not because He needed to, but to model for us the rhythm of life. Rest is not laziness; it is a recognition that we are not defined solely by our output. It is a time to reconnect with God, with family, and with our own interior life.

Fourthly, the idea that solidarity matters: In a fragmented world, Labor Day calls us to unity. We are not isolated workers competing for survival—we are brothers. Whether we labor in offices, fields, homes, or parishes, we share a common dignity and a common destiny. Our work should never isolate us but draw us into deeper communion with one another; it should help us to overcome differences in mutual respect. As I have said at exemplifications in the past, we are all brothers in Christ, whatever our politics, and being brothers in Christ, working together for the building of God's Kingdom in our parish, must always take priority and precedence over my brother's political views. Our labor for the Kingdom should unite us, not divide us!

So, as we celebrate Labor Day, let us not only enjoy the fruits of our labor but also recommit ourselves to the spiritual meaning behind it. Let us honor the dignity of every worker, including our own work. Let us offer our work to God, asking that it be sanctified and used for His glory. And let us rest—not just from toil, but in the peace of knowing that our labor, when united with Christ, is never in vain.

St. Joseph the Worker, patron of laborers and model of quiet strength, pray for us.

DEACON TOM GRANT SCHOLARSHIP FUND

One of the comments made recently about our Scholarship fund is that many people do not know who Deacon Tom Grant was. I guess that we should have expected comments like this to occur.

Our Parish has been growing and our new Parishioner's knowledge of Our Lady of Mount Carmel started on their first visit to our Church. Father Anthony has shared some astounding growth rates with me based on the increase of parishioners since he first arrived. Another measure which we might use is that our Religious Education program is now up to 51 Youth members. One last measure is definitely the number of single family homes and apartments being constructed within 5-8 miles of the Church.

If we go back 2-1/2 to 3 years, everyone knew Deacon Tom. But, with Deacon Tom's serious medical condition, and his death, we should be able to easily understand why our new Parishioners do not know who he was. We should also be able to understand why some Parishioners may have forgotten about Deacon Tom. One solution to rectify this issue is to change the name of the Scholarship Fund. However, I beg to differ.

After Father Anthony presented the Scholarship Certificates to the five recipients on August 24, the discourse seems to have changed. As I walked down the main aisle towards the rear of the Church, I heard numerous people comment on how worthy the Scholarships are. "What a great thing to do!" "I am going to increase my next donation." I didn't know that much about the Scholarships." "Did you see the smiles on their faces?" These were all things that I heard as I walked down the center aisle.

I personally do not think that the name has anything to do with our Scholarship Fund anymore. But, if we make a big deal of the name, then everyone else probably will also. If we want to make sure that Deacon Tom is remembered for all of the great things that he did, then it is up to us to help everyone remember. We have to tell his story and that story will highlight why he was chosen as the namesake.

I would suggest that we ask Father Anthony for some wall space in the hallway going back towards the classrooms. I think that we should put a large, framed picture of Deacon Tom up on the wall and put a brief biography under or next to it. We have done that for Father Fred's awesome model boats; we can do that for Deacon Tom. We should also start putting plaques with the Scholarship recipients names engraved on them close by. We should put an enlarged, framed pictures of the most recent winners on the wall near Deacon Tom's picture. I would also suggest that we have Deacon Tom donation weekends just as we have Church Membership Recruitment weekends.


It should not be difficult to highlight the attributes of Deacon Tom's service to Our Lady of Mount Carmel and then draw the connection to the importance of this Scholarship Fund. If we make a big deal out of it; then everyone else will also. The comments shared earlier from fellow parishioners tell me that the most important part of the Scholarship Fund is that we are doing it.

I also want to recognize the role that A J Magliolo has played recently in taking this program to a higher level. We continue to recognize Paul Grieco for getting this program off on the right foot and its initial stellar success. And we will never forget Sir Knight Mike LaVecchia for his idea to start it.

We did not place his name on the fund to just raise money but to honor the man. Who Was Deacon Tom Grant?

In our recent efforts to raise money for the Deacon Tom Grant Memorial Scholarship Fund, we have been asked, "Who was Deacon Tom Grant?"

Deacon Tom graduated from high school in 1965, in Cedar Grove, New Jersey. After four years in the Navy and marrying his wife, Patti, they had their daughter, Michele, in 1972. He held an Associate Degree in Business Administration and spent the next 40 years as an accountant.

Following his move to Florida in 2003, Deacon Tom began a five year program studying to become a deacon and was ordained by our Bishop in 2009. He served as the Financial Director at Sacred Heart Catholic Parish in Punta Gorda. His first and only parish assignment was here at Our Lady of Mt. Carmel where he served as the Parish Business Manager while also honoring his Deacon responsibilities. Deacon Tom was also the Chaplain of the Knights of Columbus, Council 15821. He served Our Lady of Mt. Carmel Parish for fourteen years with dignity, pride, compassion and a fervor for Christ.

Deacon Tom was diagnosed with cancer in 2023, and after 53 years of marriage to Patti, he was born to eternal life on February 23, 2024.

He was known as a good listener and storyteller and for delivering many great homilies. An adoring husband and father, he was also a superb mentor both spiritually and professionally to all. Several people admired his soft-spoken manner and his keen sense of humor.

The Deacon Tom Grant Memorial Scholarship Fund was created to honor his legacy by offering young people of our OLMC parish an opportunity to receive a quality Catholic education.

























Lecturer's Minute

Shark Bait

During a research experiment, a marine biologist placed a shark into a large holding tank and then released several small bait fish into the tank.

As you would expect, the shark quickly swam around the tank, attacked, and ate the smaller fish.

The marine biologist then inserted a strong piece of clear fiberglass into the tank, creating two separate partitions. She then put the shark on one side of the fiberglass and a new set of bait fish on the other.

Again, the shark quickly attacked. This time, however, the shark slammed into the fiberglass divider and bounced off. Undeterred, the shark kept repeating this behavior every few minutes to no avail. Meanwhile, the baitfish swam around unharmed in the second partition. Eventually, about an hour into the experiment, the shark gave up.

This experiment was repeated several dozen times over the next few weeks. Each time, the shark got less aggressive and made fewer attempts to attack the baitfish, until eventually, the shark got tired of hitting the fiberglass divider and simply stopped attacking altogether.

The marine biologist then removed the fiberglass divider, but the shark did not attack. The shark was trained to believe a barrier existed between it and the baitfish, so the baitfish swam wherever they wished, free from harm.

The moral of the story: Most people tend to give up after facing a series of setbacks and failures. But do not let these setbacks keep you from trying again. Think of each setback as an opportunity to learn. Do not let the barriers that you set for yourself in your mind keep you from achieving your goals.

Remember, nothing is impossible if your set your mind to it.



Through Christ our Lord. Amen.







Carlos was born May 3, 1991, in London and raised in Milan.

A tech-savvy teen who taught himself programming at age 7 and built websites to catalog Eucharistic miracles. He was known for his deep devotion to the Eucharist, attending daily Mass and praying the Rosary regularly.


Carlos died of leukemia at age 15 on October 12, 2006, offering his suffering for the Pope and the Church.


He was beatified in 2020 after a Brazilian boy was miraculously healed through his Intercession. He was Canonized on September 7, 2025, by Pope Leo XIV, after a second miracle involving a woman healed from head trauma.

Carlos was nicknamed "God's Influencer" for using technology to spread faith.

His incorrupt body lies in Assisi, Italy, and has become a major pilgrimage site, where he's displayed in casual clothes — jeans, sneakers, and a sweatshirt.

He's seen as a relatable model of holiness for young people, blending modern life with timeless devotion.
