

"If you love me, you will keep my commandments. And I will ask the Father, and he will give you another Advocate to be with you always." (Gospel for June 8, Jn 14:15-16)

Last month, we reflected on how Jesus probed Peter three times with the question "Do you love me?" 
POPE LEO XIV

Pope Leo XIV will be known for many firsts. He's the first <u>American-born pontiff</u>, first <u>Augustinian pope</u> — and possibly the first pope to root for the Chicago White Sox.

Before he was introduced to the world as the new pontiff Thursday, the former Cardinal Robert Prevost was known as "Father Bob" in his hometown of Chicago and "Padre Roberto" in Peru, where he spent decades.

- 1. His family has deep roots in Chicago's South Side Leo's father, Louis Prevost served in the U.S. Navy during WWII, according to the Chicago-Sun Times. Afterward, Prevost served as an educator and superintendent of a local district in Chicago's South Side. Chicagoans remembered Leo's mother, Mildred, who was known as Millie, as a librarian with a constant presence at their local parish. The Prevost family's home served as a gathering spot for members of the clergy, who also stopped by to try homemade food courtesy of Leo's mother.
- 2. He has Creole ancestry in New Orleans, genealogists say Leo is descended from Creole people of color from New Orleans, The Washington Post reported, with the pope's maternal grandparents, Louise Baquie and Joseph Martinez listed as Black in the 1900 Census, The Post reported. Martinez's birthplace was listed as "Hayti," according to census records, and they lived in New Orleans's 7th Ward, then the center of the city's Creole community. The couple was listed as White in the 1910 and 1920 censuses. They eventually moved to Chicago where Leo's mother was born. John Prevost, one of the pope's brothers, told the New York Times that the family didn't identify as Black and never discussed Creole roots. Their paternal grandparents were from France, he said. Andre Kearns, founder and chief executive of Black Ancestry, a company that researches the ancestry of people of African descent, told The Post that the evolution of the racial description of Leo's ancestors was probably an attempt to hide their African ancestry during the Jim Crow era.
- 3. Leo is a Chicago White Sox fan There were early rumblings that the native Chicagoan rooted for the Chicago Cubs, but his brother John Prevost set the record straight. "He was never ever a Cubs fan, so I don't know where that came from," John Prevost told local media Thursday. "He was always a Sox fan." The Chicago-Sun Times obtained a photo of Leo in attendance at a 2005 World Series game featuring the White Sox.
- **4. Leo was a star student in high school** He participated in many activities in high school, according to a 1972 newspaper archive from the Holland Evening Sentinel. In addition to appearing multiple times on the honor roll at St. Augustine Seminary High School, he earned a high score on the Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test, was editor in chief of his yearbook, and a member of National Honor Society and mission club. He was also the vice president and secretary of his student council, president of the library club, a senator at the local student congress and president of his senior class.
- **5.** He wanted to be a priest from a young age Louis Prevost, one of the pope's brothers who lives in Florida, told BBC News that while the other boys would play with bows and arrows growing up, Leo "would play priest." Louis Prevost said his brother would ask: "Can I give you Communion?" "He knew from an early stage that he wanted to be a priest and he did," Louis Prevost said.
- 6. He was teased for his good behavior Louis Prevost told local media that he and his brothers were a rambunctious bunch growing up, but joked that Leo was always "the holy one." "When we were little kids we used to tease him, 'You're going to be pope someday, you're too holy!" Louis Prevost said. on Friday.

- 7. He is a graduate of Villanova University Leo studied mathematics at Villanova University, a private university in Pennsylvania, where he graduated with a bachelor's degree in 1977. He maintained a connection with the only Augustinian Catholic university in the United States as an alumnus, earning an honorary degree from the institution and briefly serving on its Board of Trustees. "Whenever he comes to the United States, he stops by the university," Villanova's president, the Rev. Peter M. Donohue, told the "Today Show" Friday.
- **8.** He was known in Rome as the 'Latin Yankee' The nickname "Latin Yankee" was because of the decades he spent in Peru, ministering to the marginalized.
- **9.** He is a naturalized citizen of Peru Leo became a naturalized citizen of Peru in 2015, the same year the late Pope Francis appointed him as bishop of Chiclayo in the country's northwest.
- **10.** He is fluent in five languages Leo is a polyglot. He is fluent in English, Spanish, Italian, French and Portuguese, according to the National Catholic Reporter.
- 11. The late Pope Francis put Leo into key Vatican roles Francis entrusted him with positions of power within the Vatican. In 2022, Francis asked Leo to preside over a groundbreaking reform: adding three women to the voting panel that determines which bishop nominations are presented to the pope. Leo was appointed president of the Pontifical Commission for Latin America and leader of the Dicastery for Bishops the Vatican office that selects bishops in 2023.
- 12. He watched the movie 'Conclave' before the conclave Before Leo was sequestered for the papal conclave, he went through a routine to "keep his mind off life in the real world," John Prevost told NBC Chicago. He played his daily games of Wordle and Words With Friends. Then, the brothers chatted about current events. "I said, 'Did you watch the movie 'Conclave' so you know how to behave?' And he had just finished watching the movie 'Conclave,' " John Prevost said. "So he knew how to behave."

13. He's an amateur tennis player Leo spent some time on the tennis court during his time in Peru and said in an interview published on the Order of Saint Augustine website that he was an amateur player. "Since I left Peru, I've had few chances to play tennis, so I'm

really looking forward to getting back on court,"

Leo said in an interview after being named cardinal,
"though my new role hasn't left me with much free

time so far."

Leo said.

14. His hobbies include reading, travel and relaxing with friends In his free time, Leo likes to read, go on long walks, travel, discover new places and take in the countryside, he said in 2023 "I enjoy relaxing with friends and meeting a diverse range of people whose gifts I learn from and appreciate greatly,"


