### October is Respect Life Month



With great joy we celebrate October as Respect Life Month amid the Church's Jubilee Year of Hope. This Jubilee Year "offers us the opportunity to appreciate anew, and with immense gratitude, the gift of the new life that we have received in Baptism, a life capable of transfiguring death's drama." The life, death, and resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ is the foundation of our hope. Through Christ, our sins are forgiven, death is overcome, and life is victorious.

Yet the daily headlines remind us of how desperately our world is thirsting for the hope that only God can provide. Every day we witness the overwhelming disregard for human life: through rising rates of abortion and assisted suicide; the killing of

innocent school children, even at prayer; the mistreatment of our immigrant sisters and brothers as they endure an environment of aggression; and political and ideological violence inflicted against unsuspecting victims. These attacks threaten life precisely when it is most vulnerable and in need of protection.

Despite these realities, the gift of human life exists as a sign of hope to our world today, defying the powers of darkness and the culture of death. It is of the utmost importance that we work to ensure that every life, in every stage and circumstance, is protected in law. Earlier this year, history was made when Planned Parenthood and other big abortion businesses were banned from receiving federal Medicaid dollars for one

year. I thank Catholics across the country who have embraced a nationwide call to prayer for the end of all taxpayer funding of abortion centers, and I ask that we continue those prayers throughout October.

This Jubilee Year we are challenged to be agents of hope to those whose hearts are burdened by trial, difficulty, or suffering, offering them the hope that comes from Christ Jesus alone. <u>Walking with Moms in Need</u> and <u>Project Rachel Ministry</u> are just two examples of how the Catholic Church continuously reaches out with love, compassion, and mercy to those most in need of a message of hope.

As we begin Respect Life Month, together we embrace the words of Pope Leo XIV, "How important it is that each and every baptized person feel himself or herself called by God to be a sign of hope in the world today." Each of us is called to be a witness to the Gospel of Life, proclaiming in word and deed the innate goodness and dignity of every human person.

# Knights of Columbus Supreme Council Update

Mission of Hope and Solidarity: Knights of Columbus leaders make joint visit to Holy Land, expressing prayerful support to communities affected by war

Supreme Knight Patrick Kelly and Supreme Chaplain Archbishop William Lori of Baltimore were part of a delegation of Catholic leaders who traveled to Jerusalem, the Palestinian West Bank and Israel from September 2 to 6, in an expression of solidarity with Catholics and all those suffering from the effects of the ongoing Israel-Hamas war. They were accompanied by Supreme Secretary John Marrella, they joined Msgr. Peter Vaccari, president of Catholic Near East Welfare Association-Pontifical Mission (CNEWA), and other representatives.

"The time of this pilgrimage was chosen

precisely because there is need here in the Holy Land for people to come from elsewhere to show that they care, to show that we are in solidarity, that we want to learn and understand, and also that we want to help," said Archbishop Lori, who also serves as vice president of the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops. The voyage coincided with the 2025 Jubilee Year, which bears the theme "Pilgrims of Hope." "For us, it was a mission of hope and of solidarity with those who are suffering, and I think it's especially poignant that we're here in the Jubilee Year of Hope," said Supreme Knight Kelly. "Since our founding, we have assisted the vulnerable. Our hope is to explore some of the areas where the Knights of Columbus could provide assistance here."

The most recent wave of conflict in the Holy Land began on October 7, 2023, when Hamas militants, operating out of Gaza, attacked Israel, killing 1,200 people - mostly civilians - and taking 250 hostages. Israel responded with airstrikes, artillery bombardments and armed incursions into Gaza. As of September 4, the Gaza Health Ministry - considered a reliable source of casualty data by independent observers - reported that over 64,000 people had been killed, estimating that half were women and children. Food shortages, lack of medical care and widespread displacement have also resulted from the Israeli offensive.

The Supreme Officers' visit included meetings with Cardinal Pierbattista Pizzaballa, Latin Patriarch of Jerusalem; Father Francesco Ielpo, OFM, Custos of the Holy Land; and Josef Blotz, Grand Hospitaller of the Order of Malta. They also participated in liturgies at the Church of the Holy Sepulchre in Jerusalem, the Church of the Nativity in Bethlehem, and the Church of the Annunciation in Nazareth.

Just a week before the visit, on August 26, Cardinal Pizzaballa and Theophilos III, Greek Orthodox Patriarch of Jerusalem, issued a joint statement in which they condemned the Israeli government's stated intention to occupy Gaza City and evacuate residents. "We can only repeat what we have already said: There can be no future based on captivity, displacement of Palestinians or revenge," the patriarchs wrote. The following day, Pope Leo echoed these sentiments following his Wednesday general audience, "I implore that all the hostages be freed, that a permanent ceasefire be reached, that the safe entry of humanitarian aid be facilitated, and that humanitarian law be fully respected - especially the obligation to protect civilians and the prohibitions of collective punishment, indiscriminate use of force, and the forced displacement of the population."

Archbishop Timothy Broglio, president of the USCCB, also called for "the assistance of the Catholic community of the United States" in the region in an August 20 letter to U.S. Bishops. Echoing the concerns of the global Church, the delegation came bearing "a message of solidarity and hope to those who are suffering and in need in the great humanitarian crisis in the Gaza Strip," said Archbishop Lori. "We all come together – the CNEWA, the Knights of Columbus, the Bishops' Conference; we are, you might say, united in hope, but also united in charity."

Accordingly, the delegation also made visits of solidarity to several Christian communities in need, including Bethlehem's Piccirillo Handicraft Center, where artisans with special needs craft products from Holy Land olive trees; the St. Nicholas Home in Beit Jala, a predominantly Palestinian Christian town in the West Bank, where they met with elderly and infirm residents; and the Latin Patriarchate Seminary, also in Beit Jala.

"Despite the conflict wracking the region, these Christian communities continue to be a sign of hope, "Archbishop Lori said. "Even in this time of struggle, when there is so much deprivation, so much injustice, so many challenges just to be the Church in this land made holy - there are heroic people doing tremendously important and beautiful ministries, and my admiration for them knows no bounds," he added.

At the Holy Family Children's Home in Bethlehem, operated by the Daughters of Charity, the Supreme Knight and Supreme Chaplain stopped to cradle some of the home's infant residents in their arms as they toured the facilities. "That mission of care really touched our hearts," Supreme Knight Kelly said. "I think that's one of the ways the Knights of Columbus can assist here - helping these courageous sisters who are doing that

wonderful work." During a recording of CNEWA's "Connections with Msgr. Peter" video podcast, Supreme Secretary Marrella reflected on the connection between the charity displayed by Christian communities and the presence of Christ in the Eucharist. "What has impressed me is how you and your staff are the presence of Christ," the supreme secretary told Msgr. Vaccari. "You're carrying that [presence] - along with the Daughters of Charity and other religious orders that we visited. They are the face of Christ here."

#### This month's Bible Verse:

"But the tax collector stood off at a distance and would not even raise his eyes to heaven but beat his breast and prayed, 'O God, be merciful to me a sinner.'" (Gospel for October 26, Lk 18:13)

The parable of the Pharisee and the Tax Collector relates back to our August monthly challenge about humility. The Pharisee exalts himself before God, extolling his superiority and keeping of the law. Meanwhile, the tax collector prays with humility, seeking mercy for his sins. Our culture stresses the importance of "self-esteem," but we must also remember that all of us are sinners in need of God's mercy. We should never approach God in a spirit of pride, but always humbly on our knees — confident of his loving mercy.

#### Challenge by the Supreme Chaplain:

This month of October, the month dedicated to the holy rosary, I challenge you to pray five decades of the rosary daily, asking God for humility and mercy.

#### **Ouestions for Reflection:**

Have there been times in your life when you pridefully compared yourself to others, like the Pharisee in this parable? Do you perform a regular and careful examination of conscience so as to remain humbly aware of your sinfulness? What other steps can you take to become more like the tax collector in this parable?


### For Respect Life Month, Catholics need to be Agents of Hope

Since 1973, the Catholic Church in the United States has observed October as "Respect Life Month." ### Jubilee 2025 Pilgrims of Hope: October Jubilee Celebrations



Jubilee 2025 invites you to be a pilgrim of hope. For Christians, hope is anchored in the encounter with Jesus whose life, death, and resurrection reveals God's transforming love. Our hope in God is renewed constantly in the gift of the Holy Spirit, the love of the Father and the Son, who is given, even now, to the community of believers. The Holy See has designated a number of Jubilee Days throughout 2025 to recognize and celebrate different groups of people and various ministries in the Church.

In October 2025, there are five Jubilee Celebrations:

October 4 and 5 - <u>Jubilee of Migrants</u>; ; October 4 and 5- <u>Jubilee of the Missions</u>;

October 8 and 9 - <u>Jubilee of Consecrated Life</u>; October 11 and 12 - <u>Jubilee of Marian Spirituality</u>; and October 31 to November 2 - <u>Jubilee of the World of Education</u>.

The Jubilee Year offers faithful Catholics the opportunities to participate in various jubilee events at the Vatican and in their own dioceses. # Vatican Update

### Use wealth to help people, not destroy them, Pope says

Pope Leo XIV spoke about individual's and community's relationships to money when he celebrated Mass in the Vatican Church of St. Anne, a parish entrusted to his Augustinian confreres, and then led the midday recitation of the Angelus prayer. Pope Leo XIV prayed that the leaders of nations would use money and resources to promote the common good rather than using "wealth against humanity" by "turning it into weapons that destroy peoples or monopolies that humiliate workers."

"Whoever serves God becomes free from wealth; but whoever serves wealth remains its slave," the Pope said on September 21 in his homily in the Vatican's parish Church of St. Anne. "Whoever seeks justice transforms wealth into the common good," the Pope said, and "whoever seeks domination turns the common good into prey for their own greed."

The day's Gospel reading was Jesus' parable of the dishonest steward from Luke 16:1-13. It ends with Jesus saying, "No servant can serve two masters. He will either hate one and love the other or be devoted to one and despise the other. You cannot serve both God and mammon." At both the morning Mass in the small church located just inside Vatican City State and in his midday Angelus address with thousands of pilgrims and visitors in St. Peter's Square, Pope Leo urged Catholics to consider their relationship to money and material goods.

He also used his Angelus address to thank Catholic organizations holding prayer vigils for peace and raising

money for humanitarian aid to Gaza. "I appreciate your initiative and many others throughout the Church that express closeness to our brothers and sisters who are suffering in that tormented land," Pope Leo said. "Together with you and with the pastors of the churches in the Holy Land, I repeat: There is no future based on violence, forced exile or revenge. The people need peace; those who truly love them work for peace." A group of people in the square were holding a colorful banner that said, in Italian, "Peace for Gaza." The Pope's call for an end to the violence was met with applause.

At the Mass earlier in the Church of St. Anne, staffed by his Augustinian confreres, the Pope prayed that parishioners would "persevere with hope in a time seriously threatened by war." "Entire peoples today are being crushed by violence -- and even more so by a shameless indifference that abandons them to a fate of misery," the Pope told parishioners. "Faced with these tragedies, we do not want to be resigned, but to proclaim in word and deed that Jesus is the savior of the world, the one who delivers us from all evil."

Pope Leo prayed that the Holy Spirit would convert hearts "so that, nourished by the Eucharist -- the church's supreme treasure -- we may become witnesses of charity and peace."

Later, in his Angelus address, the Pope said Jesus' parable "invites us to ask ourselves: How are we managing the material goods, the resources of the earth and our very lives that God has entrusted to us?" Each person must make a choice, he said. "We can follow the way of selfishness, placing wealth above all else and thinking only of ourselves. But

this isolates us from others and spreads the poison of competition, which often fuels conflict." On the other hand, he said, "we can recognize everything we have as a gift from God, to be managed and used as an instrument for sharing -- to create networks of friendship and solidarity, to work for the common good and to build a world that is more just, equitable and fraternal."




# Cor Ministry of Prayer, Formation, and Fraternity
